National Preparedness Month

September is preparedness month, and I would like to share a few links that can be useful for ensuring that you and your family are better prepared to handle the various kinds of disasters that can befall us at any time. I would also like to extend my deepest gratitude to the over 600 MRC volunteers that have contributed over 16,000 hours of time to our COVID-19 response. Those numbers absolutely blow me away; they are staggering. We truly could not have had such an incredible COVID-19 response without you. You have contributed to administering over 210,000 vaccinations; 120,000 COVID tests; countless contact tracings, case investigations, and outbreak investigations, and so much more. Some of you have come to work with us permanently, and for that we are grateful as well. While our need for volunteers has greatly diminished over the past couple of months, this response is not over. In fact, with the CDC announcement that booster shots will become available on September 20 (to be administered at least 8 months after the date you became fully vaccinated), we expect a surge in demand at our Sears vaccination clinic. How much of a surge and how long it will last is very hard to predict. However, it is far better to be over prepared than under prepared, so we are planning to staff Sears back up to handle up to 1,500 vaccinations per day. That is well below our peak of 2,500 per day a few months ago, but way up from our current 100 - 300 per day. So, we expect to have more requests for MRC GEM volunteers again in September, and I know you will step up just as you have in the past. We have particular needs for Spanish speakers, clinical or non-clinical. Again, thank you for all you have done, are doing, and will continue to do.

BASIC DISASTER SUPPLY LIST

- Water (1 gallon/person/per day for several days)
- Food (at least 3-day supply non-perishable foods)
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio & NOAA radio
- Flashlight
- First aid kit
- Extra batteries
- Whistle (signal for help)
- Dust Mask (contaminated air)
- Plastic sheeting & duct tape
- Moist Towelettes, garbage bags with plastic ties
- Wrench or pliers
- Manual can Opener
- Local maps
- Cell phone with charger

A small agency with a big mission, the Gwinnett County Office of Emergency Management works with all Gwinnett city and county agencies, along with other local, state, and federal agencies to save lives, protect property, and safeguard the environment. Office of Emergency Management (OEM) does this by planning for emergencies and disasters, responding to incidents as a coordinating agency, directing mitigation against hazards, and assisting Gwinnett County Government and its residents in recovery after an incident.

September is National Preparedness Month, and this year's theme is **Prepare to Protect**. Preparing for disasters is all about protecting everyone you love, and there are simple steps we can all take to help build a more resilient community. Our Executive Director



As an MRC GEM member, we thought you might like to know a bit about what our **Executive Director, Mr. Sherwin Levinson**, does "in real life", and how he came to be involved with organizing volunteers.

Sherwin is president of a consulting firm he founded over 40 years ago, specializing in telework, organizational auditing, and disaster planning. While continuing his career as a consultant, Sherwin has been Executive Director of a 501(c)(3) nonprofit volunteer Medical Reserve Corps for nearly fourteen years. During this time, he and his MRC unit, MRC GEM, have worked closely with CDC personnel in developing the CDC's program for training radiation response volunteers.

Sherwin first became involved in emergency management after his home and neighborhood were severely damaged by the 1998 DeKalb/Gwinnett tornado. Finding his city had no emergency response plan or personnel, Sherwin became the first emergency manager for the City of Berkeley Lake, GA, and has been involved in emergency management and response ever since.

A native of Chicago, Sherwin studied physics at MIT and the University of Chicago before achieving an MBA in math methods and computers, also at U of C. He became a Georgia Emergency Management Agency Certified Emergency Manager in 2017.

Sherwin and his wife of 50 years are the parents of two and grandparents of four.
