Started Monkeypox vaccinations in July 2022. Approximately **40** of our MRC GEM volunteers have put in over **300** hours so far.



Rising to the Challenge: How Medical Reserve Corps Volunteers Serve as a Scalable Workforce for Local Health Departments in Response to COVID-19 and Beyond

MRC Answers the Call in Unprecedented Times

In the 2020 Network Profile of the Medical Reserve Corps, 84% of MRC units reported supporting COVID-19 response efforts. From January 1 to December 31, 2020, MRC volunteers contributed to a variety of local COVID-19 response efforts to total approximately 840,000 hours including approximately 330,000 hours to testing, 86,000 hours to call centers, and 142,000 hours to contact tracing. As Local Health Departments (LHD) prepared for the delivery of COVID-19 vaccines, 89% of MRC units reported being prepared to support mass vaccinations through Point of Dispensing events, with 82% of units providing community public health emergency preparedness and response trainings to their volunteers. Based on the 2021 volunteer value developed by the Independent Sector, MRC volunteers are estimated to have saved local health jurisdictions an estimated \$85 million through the provision of both medical and support services from an estimated 3 million hours of donated volunteer service in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In addition, MRC utilization has directly translated to impressive workforce savings and remarkable returns on investment. The expanded utilization of MRC units at the local, state, and federal levels through funding and resource partnership with NACCHO is expected to lead to even greater public health and emergency response outcomes into the future. By building upon past successes, communities that prioritize the MRC in their emergency public health planning are ensuring that their jurisdictions build a sustainable, trained, and ready workforce capable of surging to meet any challenges while ensuring the resiliency of their communities.
